Reminder: Call for Papers: Lydia Davis in Context seeks to commission and develop new research for a landmark edited collection that redresses the marginalisation of Davis in the contemporary literary canon and repositions her work within new literary, critical, theoretical, and aesthetic contexts. The collection seeks to re-evaluate and reinvigorate the contexts through which Davis has been commonly read (postmodern metafiction, translation, minimalism) and looks beyond them to new and unexplored facets of Davis's work. Lydia Davis in Context will make a bold case for establishing Davis as an important figure in late-twentieth century and contemporary literature. We are interested in original and innovative approaches to any aspect of Davis's work. Among other fields we'd be interested to see contributions on

- Animal studies
- Gender and sexuality
- The body and medical humanities
- Climate writing
- Philosophy
- Writing institutions and networks (the academy, publishing, poetry circles)
- Davis, postmodernism (and after)
- Art writing
- Contemporary translation theory
- Life writing /autofiction /autobiography

 Archival projects based on the newly opened Lydia Davis Papers at Columbia University

Contributors will develop their chapters for the collection at a two-day workshop at the University of York in July 2023 (exact date tbc). Researchers from any career stage are welcome. Abstracts (300 words max) and a brief author bio should be sent to Dr Lola Boorman (lola.boorman@york.ac.uk) and Dr Julie Tanner (julie.tanner@amul.ac.uk) by 1st February 2023.

Call for Papers: Section on "Social Reading and Reading Communities in Diachronic Perspective", Anglistentag, 24th - 27th September 2023, Siegen (Germany). In this section, we do not only aim to offer a critical investigation of the different ways in which reading in the digital age can be understood as (or in some cases merely appears to be) 'social'. We also would like to invite contributions on the sociality of reading in earlier periods. The design of this section is interdisciplinary in that we invite contributions from ELT as well as linguistics and literary studies. Early career colleagues are particularly encouraged to apply. The deadline for proposals has been extended to 15 February 2023.

Events

ECHIC 2023 Conference: Ecological Mindedness and Sustainable Wellbeing, 25-27 May 2023. Since the World Commission on Environment and Development published Our Common Future (1987), the notion of sustainable development has been continuously scrutinised and redefined. Sustainability has been expanded to incorporate environmental, cultural, legal, and economic aspects of a low-carbon future and to encompass the wellbeing of all living species, which involves material aspects such as the social acceptance of resource-efficient transitions and immaterial ones such as flourishing human capabilities. The conference theme – "Ecological Mindedness and Sustainable Wellbeing" – invites critical reflection on theories, methods, and practices of sustainability requiring eco-innovation and technology transfer as well as new cultural frames of mind and forms of education, social engagement, empowerment, and agency.
