Reminder: Call for Papers: BACLS What Happens Now? 2023 Conference, 6th September University of Birmingham, 8th September online.

We welcome contributions on topics from across the field of contemporary literary studies, including modern languages, comparative and world literatures, ecocriticism, postcolonial, migration and critical refugee studies, literary urban studies, disabilities studies, gender studies, translation studies, linguistics, performance studies, publishing studies, contemporary book history, media theory, comics studies, video games studies, adaptation studies, the study of popular music, cultural studies, critical theory, critical-creative practice, medical humanities, and digital humanities. We welcome submissions for presentations other than traditional, academic research papers: these might include performances and readings, or submissions related to aspects of professional development and pedagogical issues. Panel proposals and abstracts for 20-minute papers are due by this Friday, 19 May. Full CfP attached and available via our website.

As many of us have learned when teaching the literature of our moment, the professor is never the only expert in the classroom. Students bring their own specialist knowledge—whether on up and coming authors, Goodreads trends, second-hand bookstore stock, fanfic or audiobook aesthetics—of literature and literary culture at

the 'bleeding edge'. What might we learn from this knowledge? What does contemporary literature and literary culture look like through the eyes of our students?

Contributions from emerging and contingent students and scholars are encouraged, as are submissions that utilise the opportunities that digital publication presents. Please email a 250-word abstract/pitch to Rebecca Roach (r.roach@bham.ac.uk) by June 30. First drafts of submissions (of no more than 3,000 words or equivalent) will be due by Nov 1.
