Call for papers / articles / contributions

Call for Papers: Reproductive Justice and the Humanities in Times of Crisis, 21st June 2024, University of York. We are seeking proposals for 20 minutes papers to be delivered at a one-day hybrid symposium. The symposium will bring together scholars of all levels working on questions of reproductive justice in literature, film, media, and other forms of cultural representation. Our hope is that it will allow established and emerging scholars to share their current work and identify future directions for interdisciplinary research and collaboration focused on reproductive justice. The symposium will also mark the launch of a new international network in Reproductive Justice and the Humanities. Abstracts of 250 words are due by 15th January 2024. Full CFP attached.

Call for Contributions: <u>Special Issue "Dark Academia"</u> in *Literatur in Wissenschaft und Unterricht*. 'Dark Academia' is a social media trend devoted to the stylization of academic life in the humanities. Dark Academia lends itself to approaches from visual and literary studies (exploring e.g. the function of gothic, dark romantic or decadent motifs and genres; concepts like vibe, atmosphere, structure of feeling),

media and cultural studies (e.g. addressing the dynamics of social media communities, platformization, material culture; race, class and gender; (New) Englishness) and many more. The phenomenon can also be approached with concepts from cultural sociology and discourse analysis such as: students and academics as 'social figures', social and cultural capital in schools and universities; self-presentations, narratives and representations of higher education institutions; representations of knowledge or epistemological practices and timescapes. We also invite contributions that take Dark Academia as a point of departure for charting the post-pandemic situation of the humanities. Papers can build on the thought-provoking yet impressionistic essays in a 2022 Post-45 issue on Dark Academia (edited by Olivia Stowell and Mitch Therieau). Abstracts of 400 words are due by the end of January 2024. Full papers are due by 1st July 2024. Full CfP attached.

Book Contracts for Forthcoming Publications:

Dominic Dean's monograph Killing Children in British Fiction: Thatcherism to Brexit is now under contract with SUNY Press, due to be published in 2024. Congratulations! Short synopsis: As the twentieth century entered its final decades and the twenty-first began, British fiction became full of children killing, being killed, or both. Killing Children in British Fiction: Thatcherism to Brexit is a major new study of how literature, film and culture has used these children to explore conflicts over the British future from the rise of Thatcherism to the Brexit era. Exploring work from 1970s horror films to novels by Kazuo Ishiguro, Ian McEwan, Sarah Waters, Jim Crace, Dorris Lessing and

Melissa Harrison, set alongside real disappearances, abuses and moral panics, Killing Children in British Fiction offers a new reading of the intersection between real and imagined violence towards the child and the future. This includes both a dark and complex account of recent British cultural history, and an intervention that will engage and provoke scholars of childhood, contemporary fiction, Psychoanalysis, and critical and queer theory.

Julia Ditter's monograph Scottish Literature, Borders and the Environmental Imagination is under contract with Bloomsbury Academic to be published in 2024. Short blurb: Bringing together concerns in border studies, the environmental humanities and Scottish literary studies, this book examines the relationship between borders and the environment in Scottish literature from the nineteenth-century to the present. Developing an innovative methodology that approaches Scotland from an interdisciplinary perspective, this book puts key debates in Scottish studies, literary theory, critical border studies and the environmental humanities into dialogue to highlight the critical intervention that Scottish literature can make in current theoretical discussions about borders and the environment.
