Call for papers / articles / contributions

Call for Papers: 'The Functions of Criticism', 19-20 May 2023, University of Cambridge. Keynotes: Rita Felski (University of Virginia), Jonathan Kramnick (Yale University), and Sarah Dillon (University of Cambridge). This event will be an interdisciplinary, two-day conference exploring questions of function, use, and method in the humanities, jointly supported by the Centre for Research in the Arts, Social Sciences, and Humanities, and the Faculty of English. Call for Papers: 'Gylphi Contemporary Writers: Ali Smith Symposium', 26 April 2023, University of Cambridge. We welcome papers that engage with the rise of new critical approaches that have continued to transform and develop alongside Smith's writing, notably ecocriticism, meta-modernism, intertextuality and connections to visual art, postcriticism, recent queer/trans theory, and refugee/border studies that speak to her work and would enable the planned new collection of essays to reflect the most exciting current modes of critical engagement with her writing. The symposium will lead to the publication of a volume in the Gylphi Contemporary Writers: Critical Essays series. Abstracts due by 10th January 2023.

TODAY The Punk Rock Politics of Joe Strummer - book launch event with Gregor Gall, 9th November, 7pm. (online). Gregor Gall, author of The Punk Rock Politics of Joe Strummer (Manchester UP) will give a talk about his work, which will be followed by a Q and A session on Gregor's book and all matters Joe Strummer. The online event will be hosted by James Peacock (Keele University).

BACLS Research Seminar: Monograph Prize Winner Showcase, 2nd December, 2pm. The first BACLS Online Seminar of 2022-23 promises to be a fascinating one: the joint winners of the 2022 BACLS Monograph Prize – Caroline Magennis (Salford) and Ian Hickey (Mary Immaculate College) – will talk about their monographs and participate in a discussion with BACLS members on issues arising from their research. Caroline Magennis's book, Northern Irish Writing after the Troubles: Intimacies, Affects, Pleasures (Bloomsbury), explores the ways in which the "post"-conflict period has led writers to a renewed engagement with intimacy, the body and pleasure. It examines work by a range of exciting contemporary writers, including Lucy Caldwell, Jan Carson, Bernie McGill and David Park. Ian Hickey's book, Haunted Heaney: Spectres and the Poetry (Routledge), explores Seamus Heaney's poetry through the lens of hauntology, illuminating the many significances of ghosts as, among other things, literary influences and legacies of British colonialism.
